JCCDC provides activities for all families to gain knowledge and skills in a variety of areas identifies by surveys conducted by the agency. In addition to parent training opportunities, the agency promotes the engagement of males in support of the Fatherhood Initiative.

(G) JCCDC's efforts to prepare children for kindergarten

Using each child's individualized GOLD assessment from Teaching Strategies, parents and providers work together to provide opportunities for all children to gain knowledge and skills necessary for school readiness. A transition meeting is held during the spring to assist families in preparedness for the transition to school, materials are distributed to the children and their families including a Transition Report for the public school personnel that shares developmental progress. Early Head Start families receive a similar Transition Report to be shared with any agency or Head Start Provider/ Center the family selects for continuing care.
