- Serve children whose parents are enrolled in training/educational programs or working parents whose income meets Federal guidelines.
- Continue to provide full-day, full-week Head Start/Early Head Start services to working families supporting the child's health and well-being.
- Utilize technology for growth and development.
- Support the implementation of developmentally appropriate childcare and early learning activities aligned with reliable outcomes identified and evaluated through data collection.
- Continue engagement in opportunities or support community engagement experience.
- Support professional development of JCCDC staff in enhancing the knowledge and skills to perform tasks associated with the delivery of comprehensive services.



PROGRAMS

EARLY HEAD START FAMILY CHILD PROGRAM

JCCDC became a grantee for the Early Head Start Family Child Care (EHSFCC) Program in 2010 to provide comprehensive child and family development services for low-income pregnant women and families with infants and toddlers from birth to three years of age. The Early Head Start (EHS) Program serves 39 infants and toddlers and 3 pregnant women. JCCDC is the only Head Start grantee funded to serve Head Start eligible children and families solely in a full day family childcare setting.

HEAD START FAMILY CHILD PROGRAM

The JCCDC Head Start Family Child Care (HSFCC) Program was originally founded in 1984 to serve 100 children. As of the 2022-23 fiscal year, the program now serves 212 children. The Full-day, full-year childcare is provided near the residences of enrolled children in licensed family childcare homes where no more than six (6) children are enrolled or licensed family group homes where 12 or fewer children are enrolled. With the newly established center-based partnership, JCCDC serves 36 children in conventional classroom settings.

CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAM

Since 1977, JCCDC has served as a sponsor for the Child Nutrition Program (CNP) under the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for licensed family childcare homes. The Alabama Department of Education, Office of Child Nutrition contracts with JCCDC to provide this service in Jefferson, Shelby, Walker, St. Clair, Etowah, and Blount counties.

JCCDC contracts approximately 95 licensed family childcare and group homes for CNP services. The goal of the Child Nutrition Program is to improve nutritional status and diets of young children.

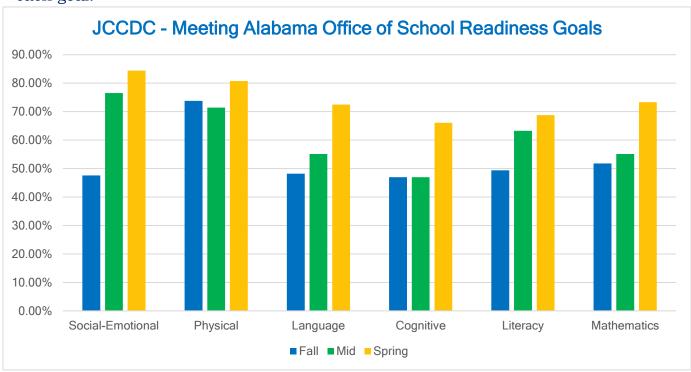

SCHOOL READINESS OUTCOME

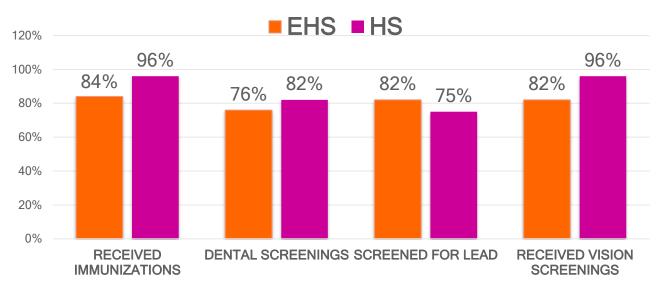
JCCDC offers an effective school readiness approach in a high-quality early care and learning environments for all children, which provides inviting experiences that support and sustain learning, inspire curiosity and exploration, demonstrate language-rich and engaged teacher-child interactions especially for our dual language learners across all learning domains, and is supported by resources, tools, and materials. JCCDC has shown progress in promoting school readiness through the implementation of research-based curricula and best practices.

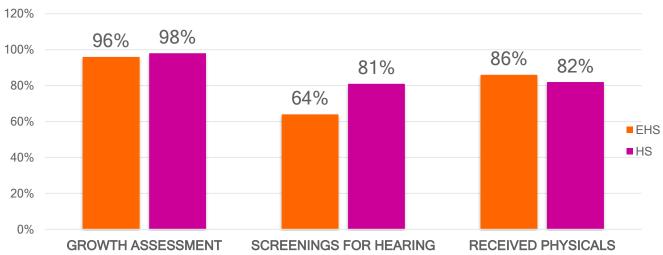
This year, children in Early Head Start and Head Start classrooms were assessed using Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ), a tool that provides reliable, accurate developmental and social-emotional screening for children that allows for the ongoing tracking of a child's developmental progress while enabling teachers to meet a child's individual needs. Teaching Strategies GOLD (TSG) is also an assessment tool used to track children's developmental progression, with goals for 0-36 months (EHS) and 37-72 months (HS); it covers 38 objectives for children to demonstrate growth over the course of the year. In alignment with the Early Learning State standard and the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework, TSG assessments increase in complexity over the year to measure skills children learn throughout the year; a score ≥80% is considered proficient. TSG is completed on each child at the beginning (Fall), middle (Mid), and end (Spring) of each school year.

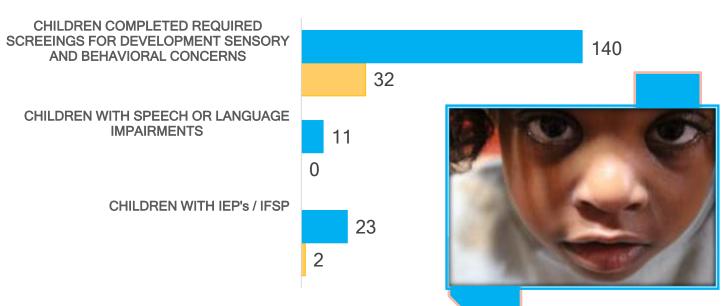
The chart depicts the average number of items achieved by all children assessed for each goal.

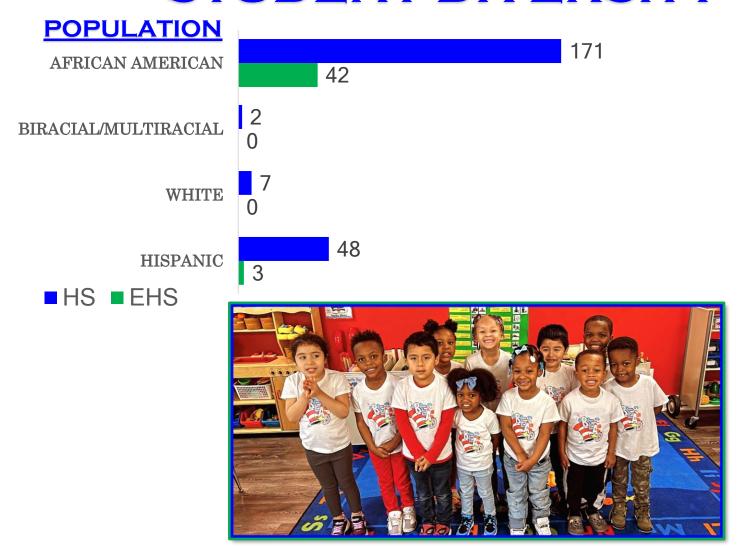

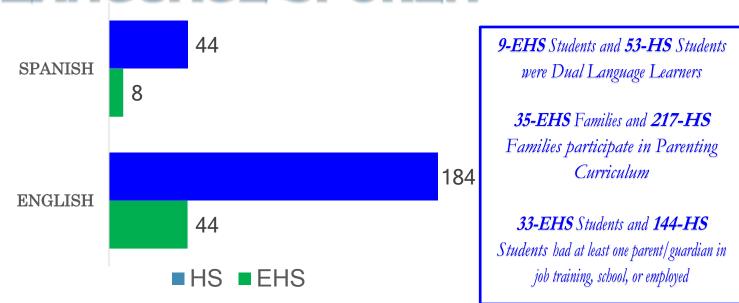

AUDITS. MONITORING & ASSESSMENTS

FEDERAL PROGRAM MONITORING

From May 2, 2022, to May 6, 2022, the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) conducted a Focus Area One (FA1) monitoring review of the Jefferson County Child Development Council, Inc. Head Start and Early Head Start programs. The monitoring review results indicated that all areas of the JCCDC HSEHS were in compliance with the requirements of the Head Start Program Performance Standards (HSPPS) or Public Law 110- 134, Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act of 2007.

SELF-ASSESSMENT

The annual self-assessment is a tool used to monitor progress toward program goals, compliance with Head Start regulations, and effectiveness in promoting school readiness. The data gives the program a chance to identify and make appropriate course corrections. The self-assessment team included Head Start and Early Head parents, staff and Board members. The annual self-assessment was completed on January 20, 2024. The results were approved by the Policy Council on February 13, 2024, and the Board of Directors on February 15, 2024.

COMMUNITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT

The agency completes a comprehensive community needs assessment every five years with annual updates. The needs assessment along with other program data informs program decision making for current and future services. Annual updates include changes in demographics and current work/school schedules for families involved in the program. The annual update is being prepared and will be brought to the Board of Directors in Winter of 2025.



RESULTS OF THE MOST RECENT FINANCIAL AUDIT

For the period ending May 31, 2024, Jefferson County Child Development Council, Inc. financial statements were awarded a modified opinion from Sheppard-Harris & Associates, P.C. public accounting firm. This is the best opinion that the agency can receive and there were no noted findings with the audit.
